10 11 12	WHEREAS,	There has in recent years been a need for a uniform University policy concerning awarding posthumous degrees; therefore be it
13 14 15	RESOLVED:	That the family or other interested parties of the deceased student may initiate a request for posthumous degree through the student's department; and be it further
16 17 18 19	RESOLVED:	That the majority of faculty in the department of the student's major may recommend to the President the award of a posthumous degree to the family of a deceased student when that student has satisfactorily completed at least two-thirds (2/3) of all coursework towards a degree; and be it further
20 21 22 23	RESOLVED:	That under special or unusual circumstances the President or designee may grant the awarding of a posthumous degree or certificate for a student who has completed less than two-thirds (2/3) of the degree course work.
