Background:

EO 792 defines the WU Grade as follows:

WU (Withdrawal Unauthorized). The symbol 'WU'shall be used where a student, who is enrolled on the census date, does not officially withdraw from a course but fails to complete it. Its most common use is in those instances where a student has not completed sufficient course assignments or participated in sufficient course activity to make it possible, in the opinion of the instructor, to report satisfactory or unsatisfactory completion of the class by use of the letter grade (A - F). The instructor shall report the last known date of attendance by the student. The symbol "WU" shall be identified as a failing grade in the transcript legend and shall be counted as units attempted but not passed in computing the grade point average. In courses which are graded Credit/No Credit or in cases where the student has elected Credit/No Credit evaluation, use of the symbol "WU" is inappropriate and "NC" shall be used instead, The following statement shall appear in the campus catalog:

The symbol "WU" indicates that an enrolled student did not withdraw from the course and also failed to complete course requirements. It is used when, in the opinion of the instructor, completed assignments or course activities or both were insufficient to make normal evaluation of academic performance possible. For purposes of grade point average and progress point computation this symbol is equivalent to an "F."

If local campus policy prescribes other instances where this symbol may be used, the foregoing statement shall be extended to cover such instances.

UNITED STATES CULTURAL PLURALISM REQUIREMENT

<u>List of USCP courses</u>

Proposing a USCP Course

Policy

Beginning with the 1994-97 Catalog, students are required to complete one USCP course. This requirement is fulfilled by courses in Major, Support, General Education (GE), or Free Elective category.

Objectives

- To bring greater multicultural perspective to all Cal Poly students;
- to foster greater understanding of cultural and ethnic differences in the United States and in relation to a wider world;
- to help students appreciate differing cultural values and assumptions and the "relativity of otherness;"
- to nourish tolerance for and enjoyment of cultural diversity; and
- to encourage American commonalities and continuities amidst diversity.

Criteria

United States Cultural Pluralism (USCP) courses fulfill the following criteria:

- 1. Emphasis on one or more of these four U.S. cultures: Asian American, African American, Hispanic American, American Indian;
- 2. Attention to general issues of gender, diversity, equity, ethnocentricity, and ethnicity; and the relationships to problems facing contemporary society, especially those resulting from racism, discrimination and cultural conflict;
- 3. Application of rigorous pedagogical, scholarly methods and standards as evidenced in substantive exams, reports, papers, and projects; and
- 4. Attention to critical thinking skills which will allow students to address cultural, racial, and gender issues in a sensitive and responsible manner and to evaluate their own attitudes and those of others.

Subject: Distinguished Teaching Award

Bill and Warren,

I'm attaching two documents, "Distinguished Teaching Award Committee" and "Distinguished Teaching Award 1964-2006," which

detail the procedures of the committee and the history of the award.

Regarding the procedures of the committee, I would point out the following:

- Only award recipients can serve as members of the committee.
- The committee determines its own policies and procedures with no oversight.
- · Only students and alumni may submit nominations.
- Only full-time tenured faculty members are eligible for the award.

This is in contrast to the Distinguished Scholarship Award Committee, which represents all colleges plus PCS; accepts nominations from faculty, students, and alumni; makes all full-time faculty members eligible.

Regarding the history of the award, I would point out the following:

- The absolute totals by college are disproportionate; CLA has received 54 awards out of 135 and CSM has received 36.
- CAED has not received an award since 1983.
- Comparing percentage of enrollment to percentage of awards, CLA had 17% of enrollment as of Fall 2006 and 40% of awards; CSM had 10% of enrollment and 27% of awards.

The percentage of awards should probably be compared to percentage of FTEF, but Steve Reins in Statistics has assured me that these numbers point to a significant trend.

At the very least, I would recommend that the Distinguished Teaching Award procedures be revised in the following manner:

- · All colleges should be represented on the committee with a preference for award winners.
- The procedures should be subject to approval by the Executive Committee.
- Faculty, students, staff, and alumni should be able to make nominations.
- All full-time faculty members should be eligible.

In addition, I would recommend that the procedures include some statement of equitability, i.e. a desire to honor faculty members from different ranks and colleges.

Furthermore, I would suggest that there should be comparability between the procedures of the Distinguished Teaching Award and the Distinguished Research Award. My plan would be to charge

Michael Geringer, chair of the Distinguished Teaching Award Committee, and Don Choi, chair of the Distinguished Scholarship Award Committee, to work together on a revision.

I would like your advice and support in addressing this matter. I have tried without success to persuade the Distinguished Teaching Award Committee to address these problems, and I am hoping that the members may be more amenable to a request from the President or the Provost.

Distinguished Teaching Award Committee

Type of Committee: Academic Senate Standing Committee

Membership: The Distinguished Teaching Award (DTA) Committee will be composed

of five General Faculty members from different colleges, when possible, and two students. The faculty members will be appointed by the Chair of the Academic Senate with the approval of the Executive Committee. These faculty members will be award recipients and will serve two-year staggered terms. Colleges that are not represented during a term of membership will be rotated onto the committee when a member needs to

be replaced.

ASI Requirements: Two student representatives with at least junior standing, who are

carrying at least seven quarter units, have completed at least three consecutive quarters and thirty-six quarter units at Cal Poly, and have a

Cal Poly grade point average of at least 3.0.

Responsibilities: The DTA Committee will conduct the selection process and determine

the policies and procedures to be used for judging potential candidates for the award. Nominations will be received during the fall quarter, and final selection will be made no leter than the givth week of spring

final selection will be made no later than the sixth week of spring

quarter.

DTA Nomination and Award Criteria:

Students or alumni may submit one or more nominations, which include the professor's name, department, and a supporting statement containing evidence of merit based upon the following criteria:

- Techniques that show excellence in teaching.
- Innovative instructional approaches.
- A high degree of interaction with students.
- High personal and professional standards.
- Well-organized activities, lectures, or labs.
- Teaching procedures that stimulate thinking and that contribute to student interest, enthusiasm, and achievement.
- A concern for students as individuals.
- Fair, rigorous methods for evaluating students' progress.
- Evidence of significant professional development as it relates to teaching excellence.

Please note: only full-time tenured faculty members who are teaching during the current academic year and who have not previously received the award are eligible for nomination.

DTA Timeline and Process:

There is a six-week nomination period, from the end of October to the beginning of December. All nominations are electronic. All nominations are considered if the faculty member is eligible, even if some of the information is lacking. Promotion of the nomination process is done through the Cal Poly home page, computer lab notices, My Cal Poly, Mustang Daily ads, solicited Mustang Daily articles, e-mail to students, alumni, and award recipients, announcements sent to department offices and student clubs, a posting in the DU, a listing on the ASI electronic bulletin board, and a mass e-mail reminder to students in December.

All nominations are screened by the Academic Senate Office to ensure eligibility. Eligible nominations are made available to DTA Committee members during finals week of fall quarter. Committee members review all nomination materials, and then the committee meets on Friday afternoon of the first week of winter quarter to select finalists and alternates. Letters (electronic and hard copy) are sent to finalists immediately after the meeting. Receipt by the Academic Senate Office of schedules and other requested winter quarter materials from finalists is expected by the end of January, and these materials are repacked for committee members within a week. Another collection of spring quarter materials is completed by the beginning of April and repacked for committee members within two days.

Visitation of finalists' classes commences at the beginning of the fifth week of winter quarter, and visitations continue through the end of the fifth week of spring quarter. It is recommended that each DTA Committee member visit each nominee at least once per quarter per course preparation, for at least one hour per visit.

The DTA Committee meets at the end of the fifth week of spring quarter to discuss results of the visitation process and to select proposed award winners (usually three). The names of recommended award winners are forwarded to President Baker no later than the sixth week of spring quarter. After approval by the President, letters are sent to winners and to other finalists.
