Characteristics of Students Enrolled at Cal Poly, San Luis Obispo

New Students for Fall 2004

Cal Poly processed a total of 28,274 applications during the Fall 2004 application cycle – the most Fall applications processed in the past seventeen years. Undergraduate applications numbered 27,062, an increase of 2,169 over Fall 2003; 9,879 new undergraduate applicants were selected and 3,704 enrolled.

First-time freshmen applying for admission numbered 22,551 (83.3% of the total undergraduate applicant pool) and represented 79.2% of the new undergraduates who enrolled.

Cal Poly received 2,920 early decision applications for Fall 2004, 701 students were selected, and 554 (79.0%) enrolled.

Enrollment

The University enrolled 17,582 students (headcount) for Fall 2004, a decrease of 721 students from Fall 2003. Undergraduate enrollment was 16,639 students, down 3.6% from Fall 2003.

Continuing and returning undergraduate students fell short of the targeted enrollment by 334 students, with 12,853 students enrolling in Fall 2004.

New undergraduate enrollment was 32 students above target at 3,836 students. This includes 2,933 new freshmen, 771 new transfers, and 132 other new undergraduates*.

Post-baccalaureate also fell short of the targeted enrollment by 47 students. Total post-baccalaureate enrollment was 943 students.

Fall 2004 saw another increase in the overall average units taken per student to 14.20 (14.38 for undergraduates and 10.94 for post-baccalaureates).

**Other undergraduate students include transitory students and those returning to a new major.*

Study Abroad

In Fall 2004, 70 Cal Poly students studied in 9 countries as part of the California State University system's International Programs. The students' courses of study represented a variety of disciplines, and most participated in intensive language study at their host university.

As part of the National Student Exchange program, the only nationwide domestic student exchange program, 17 Cal Poly students studied at other universities across the U.S. Cal Poly is hosted 19 NSE students during 2004-05.

Several Cal Poly colleges and departments hold individual exchange agreements with universities worldwide. This Fall, 27 students participated in exchanges to seven countries: Australia,

Brazil, Canada, Denmark, France, Germany, and Sweden. Other opportunities exist to study in Honduras, India, Norway, the Philippines, Switzerland, Taiwan, and the United Kingdom.

Cal Poly sent two professors and 45 students to the London Study Program during Fall quarter 2004. One Cal Poly faculty and 31 students participated in the program during Fall 2003.

The Valladolid Fall Studies Program in Spain had 17 students and one Cal Poly professor participating in Fall 2004.

Other Study Abroad opportunities include the Thai Study Program, the Japan Study Program, and the Cal Poly at Sea Program, a collaboration between Cal Poly and the California Maritime Academy.

International Students

In Fall 2004, Cal Poly enrolled 152 international students, including 124 undergraduates and 28 post-baccalaureate students. These students came from 38 countries. Countries sending four or more students to Cal Poly include Australia, Denmark, France, Germany, India, Indonesia, Japan, Malaysia, Mexico, Myanmar (Burma), Norway, Sweden, and Taiwan (based on students' reported institution of origin).

Financial Aid

During the 2003-04 academic year approximately 57% of all enrolled Cal Poly students received some type of traditional financial assistance, such as scholarships, loans, grants and work-study.

The amount of financial aid awarded in 2003-04 totaled over \$79 million (an increase of over 10% over 2002-03).

During the 2003-04 academic year, federal, state, and state university grants accounted for 26% of the financial aid dollars distributed. Scholarships accounted for 11%; loans, 62%; and federal work study, about 1%.

Housing

As of October 1, 2004, 3,668 students (20.9% of the total enrollment) lived on campus: 2,134 men (58%) and 1,534 women (42%). The remaining students lived off campus, with the majority residing in the city of San Luis Obispo.

On-campus housing includes Cerro Vista, apartments which opened in Fall 2003, accommodating nearly 800 students.



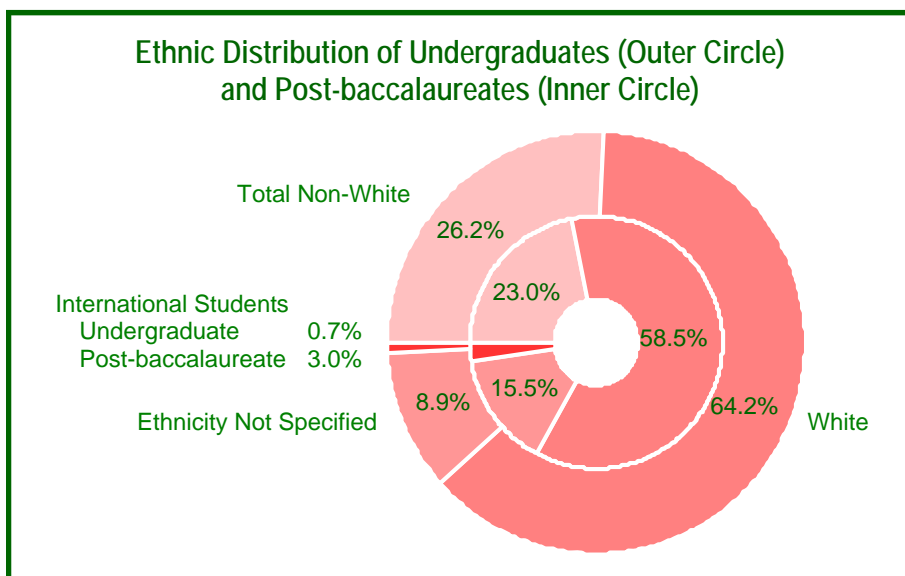

Cal Poly's undergraduate student population has experienced distinct changes in ethnic diversity over the past decade. The proportion of non-white students grew from 26.6% in Fall 1990 to a high of 34.0% in Fall 1995. During the rest of the decade, ethnic diversity declined, returning to 26.4% in Fall 2000. In Fall 2004, 26.2% of Cal Poly's undergraduates identified themselves as non-white. (Student ethnic origin is self-reported.)

Typically, the entering class is slightly more diverse than continuing students. Non-white students represented 31.5% of the new undergraduates in Fall 1995. This proportion grew to 34.9% in Fall 1997, then dropped sharply in Fall 1998 to 30.0%. This decrease in diversity continued through Fall 2003, when 26.3% of new undergraduates were non-white. In Fall 2004, there was a slight increase, 26.8% of new undergraduates students identified themselves as non-white.

In recent years, an increasing number of students have declined to specify their ethnic origin, complicating trend analysis. This percentage grew from about 7% through the mid-1990's to a peak of 13% in Fall 2000 and returned to almost 9% in Fall 2004. The increase in students who don't report their ethnic background complicates trend analysis because it makes the percentage of white and non-white less comparable from year to year.



Student Age and Gender

The average age of all Cal Poly students enrolled in Fall 2004 was 21.4 years. Undergraduates averaged 20.9 years, compared to 24.0 years for all undergraduates enrolled in the CSU system

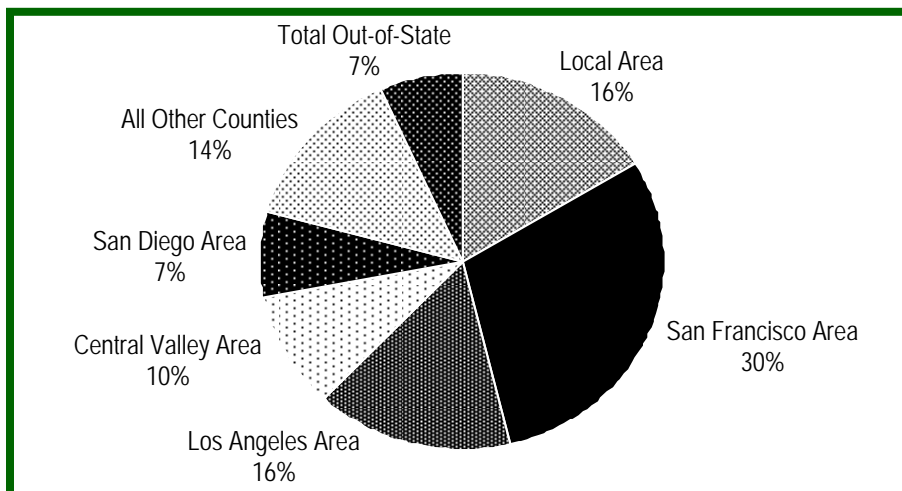
(based on last available data, Fall 2002). There were 7,590 females (43.2%) and 9,992 males (56.8%) enrolled for Fall 2004. Post-baccalaureate enrollment, traditionally

more female, has shown a steady decrease in female enrollment over the last few years. In Fall 2004, 48.9% of the campus-wide graduate population was female, down from 51.8% in Fall 2003.

Undergraduate's Geographic Origin

In Fall 2004, Cal Poly undergraduate students came from every county in California, 47 other states and U.S. territories, and 31 foreign countries. Nevertheless, 93% are California residents.

The 16% of undergraduate students who are local area residents include students from Santa Barbara County (4%), Monterey County (2%) and San Luis Obispo County (11%).



Retention & Persistence to Graduation

The following data is derived from a comprehensive cohort study developed by Institutional Planning and Analysis. To date, the study follows the retention of students first enrolling in the Summer and Fall of 1990 through Fall 2002.

Six year graduation rates for first-time freshmen are available for the 1991

through 1998 freshmen cohorts. (The six-year observation interval is the rate most often used by federal and other reporting bodies.)
