# **PAB Reaccredits BSCRP** and MCRP Programs

Affirming the continued quality and excellence of its faculty, staff, curriculum, and resources, the CRP Department's BSCRP and MCRP programs have been reaccredited through 2019, given needed performance reports.

Accreditation is a system for recognizing educational institutions and professional programs for performance, integrity, and quality. The accreditation was conducted by the Planning Accreditation Board (PAB).

With this successful outcome the CRP Department looks forward to implementing a strategic plan to consolidate and improve its uniquely practice-based curriculum. It plans to enhance the student experience through expanding and improving facilities and technological infrastructure. It hopes to diversify the student and faculty composition and embrace the opportunity to engage in planning work nationally and internationally. The CRP Department is actively seeking funding to achieve these goals.

The accreditation process was a lengthy and involved about 18 months of preparation by department staff, faculty, and students. Even during the lull of the summer quarter, staff was busy with an extensive self study that culminated in a five-volume report. The PAB conducted a site visit last fall that included interviews of faculty and students.

# Cal Poly Team Wins Low Income Housing **Challenge for Second Consecutive Year**

On May 22, 2012, an interdisciplinary team of nine Cal Poly students won the annual Bank of America Merrill Lynch Low Income Housing Challenge, tying with an entry from UC Berkeley. This marks the second consecutive year that Cal Poly has earned top honors in this competition.

The winning entry came from Poly Led Affordable Neighborhoods (PLAN), one of two teams from Cal Poly. Working with Los Angeles-based nonprofit developer PATH Ventures, PLAN proposed Project Alere, to provide 32 units of affordable rental housing targeting low-income, single-parent headed households in the City of Inglewood. The team designed a residential community that would provide an affordable, supportive, and convenient environment for this demographic. Alere features a daycare facility for young children.

The compeition judges were impressed by the thoughtfulness of Alere's design, its replicability, the soundness of its proforma, impact in a community of modest means.

Cal Poly also fielded a strong entry from Equitable Concepts in Housing Opportunity (ECHO). Partnering with ROEM Corporation, ECHO proposed Sakura Village, a rental development located in the City of San Jose's Japantown. Utilitizing modular construction methods and incorporating many sustainability measures, Sakura Village was a study in innovative design in a physically challenging site.

This was a first for Cal Poly to submit multiple team entries. Teams included students from City and Regional Planning, Architecture, Business, Construction Management, and Landscape Architecture.


Top: ECHO's proposal for Sakura Village in San Jose includes an innovative "green wall."

## **MCRP Forms New Student Association**






## Michael Boswell, Adrienne Greve

Local Climate Action Planning is a collaboration between Professors Michael Boswell and Adrienne Greve, with Tammy Seale, Managing Director of Sustainability and Climate Change Services at PMC. The authors sought to create a resource that would be accessible to planners, public officials, citizens, students, and others interested in reducing greenhouse gas emissions (GHGs) through comunity based Climate Action Plans (CAPs). CAPs are essentially a community's visions for reducing GHGs and preparing for the impacts of climate change. With 160 cities and counties having already completed a CAP, and more than 1,000 having made a commitment to do so, this book makes a timely contribution. Local Climate Action Planning is published by Island Press.

### **Umut Toker**

Professor Umut Toker says work for his book Making Community Design Work first began when he was a doctoral student working under North Carolina State University Professor Henry Sanoff, an expert on community design. Drawing from Sanoff's work, Toker shows how planners can guide the community planning process toward effective decision making and good community design. This book presents good participation in design from project level to regional scale. The book illustrates ways successful planning projects can address both the physical space and users needs. Making Community Design Work is published by APA Planners Press.



## Michael Multari

The Guide to Local Government Finance in California distills the complexities of this topic in a comprehensive and accessible manner. This book will be useful for local officials, business leaders, planners, and others. Multari and coauthors Michael Coleman, Bill Statler, and frequent CRP quest lecturer and former San Luis Obispo City Manager Kenneth Hampian saw a need for a quide that would complement William Fulton's authoritative text Guide to California Planning. The book covers essential concepts such as budgeting, accounting, and investing, that have a significant impact on the ability of cities, counties, and special districts to deliver essential services. Guide to Local Government Finance in California is published by Solano Press.

## **CRP Attends National APA Conference**

CRP students, faculty, and alumni converged April 14-17th at the 2012 National Planning Conference in Los Angeles. First time generous support from the Cal Poly's Instruction Related Activities Fund (IRA) allowed many students to participate in the nation's largest planning event.

MCRP students Trina Blanchett and


