Matthew Ewing is the new Vice President of Development and CEO of the Cal Poly Foundation and his unit directly supports RFSC. The president and vice president were eager to hear what we had to say and improve the good things that are already happening. Our focus was built around “What RFSC has done for the university in the past and could do better in the future” and “What the university has done for

RFSC in the past and could do better in the future.” The plan is for all to review in the future the discussions and take action. One RFSC board recommendation was to provide a visible physical location recognizing emeritus faculty and staff. One possibility would be an electronic device providing that recognition in the library after it is renovated.

Parking: Several reserved parking spots will be available at the Performing Arts Center parking structure (Parking Lot G5). These spots should be used by those challenged to walk a great distance from the parking lot to the PAC lobby.

In recognition of the Indigenous peoples of San Luis Obispo, Cal Poly proudly named the new residential community, yakʔitʔutʔu, which means “our community” in the yak titʔu titʔu yak tiʔhini Northern Chumash language.

Dedicated in honor of Cal Poly’s relationship with the Northern Chumash, this student housing complex features seven residential halls named after yak titʔu titʔu yak tiʔhini Northern Chumash sites throughout the Central Coast region. Together, the university and Indigenous people of San Luis Obispo will serve to educate future generations of Cal Poly students and local residents.

Yakʔitʔutʔu opened fall quarter and houses 1,475 first-year students in seven residence halls. This new complex is located at the Grand Avenue entrance to campus and is right across the street from the Yosemite and Sierra Madre Residence Halls.

The yakʔitʔutʔu residential community includes a new Welcome Center, an adjacent parking structure, large open spaces for outdoor activities, an amphitheater, a café, community rooms, and ample bike parking. Multiple Residential Learning Communities are housed in yakʔitʔutʔu's seven residence halls, which vary in size from three to five stories and provide double- and quad- occupancy. With the completion of this new facility, the university now houses nearly 8,000 students on campus.

Don Morris, long-time member of RFSC and our Membership Enhancement officer, reminds us that 58 years ago, on October 29, 1960, the Cal Poly football team plane crashed and burned upon take off near Toledo, Ohio, after playing nearby Bowling Green State University. Sixteen Mustang football players, the student manager, a member of the Mustang Booster Club, and four others perished that October

29.

On Wednesday, October 3, Dr. Gil Stork, retired President of Cuesta College, and a surviving football player riding on the plane, will be the guest speaker for the October monthly dinner at the Estrella Warbirds Museum in Paso Robles. He will explain how the aircraft accident influenced his life.

FRIENDS IN PASSING

Al Amaral (Cal Poly Foundation) passed away in August. Al graduated from Cal Poly in 1965 and returned three years later to teach agriculture management. He left the department to take over the helm of the Cal Poly Foundation where he remained for the next 28 years until his retirement. Al served as president of the Auxiliary Organization Association in 1977 and in 1989 he was CAFES Honored Alumnus and received the Outstanding Staff Employee award in 1986. He and his wife, Rose, established the Al and Rose Amaral Ag Enterprise Endowment to benefit future generations of Cal Poly students.

Lloyd "Bud" Beecher (History) died in July. He began his career at Cal Poly in 1969 as a history professor and retired after 32 years at Cal Poly. While at Cal Poly he received the Distinguished Teaching Award. After retirement, Bud went on to have a second career as a Marriage and Family Therapist for 15 years.

John Bullaro (Recreation, Parks and Tourism) passed away in July. He completed his teaching career at Cal Poly (1993 until 2009) after teaching for the Leisure Studies Department at California State University, Northridge. While there he developed one of the first commercial recreation courses taught at the university level. John considered his time at Cal Poly to be the highlight of his professional career.

David George (Political Science) died in May. He spent a year at the CSU Chancellor's Office developing and implementing the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences to be used by professors in the CSU system. He came to Cal Poly in 1970 where he remained until his retirement in 2005. He challenged conventional thinking and encouraged excellence in research.

Richard K. Dickey (Electrical Engineering) died in July. He taught for 30 years at Cal Poly retiring in 1986.

Daniel Howard-Greene (President's Office) passed away in June. He served as Chief of Staff under President Emeritus Warren J. Baker and provided transition support between President Baker, Acting-President Glidden, and President Jeffrey Armstrong.

Alberto Jiménez (Mathematics) died in August. He began a second career at Cal Poly after working for IBM and several start-ups in the Silicon Valley. He taught everything from calculus to numerical analysis for 12 years until finally retiring in 2011.

James Kalathil (Physics) died in January. He began his career at Cal Poly in 1965 and retired in 1998. He was very involved in teaching introductory physics sequences and atmospheric physics.

Richard Kranzdorf (Political Science) died in April. Before beginning his Cal Poly career, Richard joined the Peace Corps and traveled in Africa teaching journalism and piano at the University of Nigeria for two years. After additional education, he began teaching at Cal Poly in 1971 and retired in 2008.

Donald McCaleb (Public Affairs) passed away in April in Colorado Springs. He retired in 1991 after 30 years at Cal Poly. After retirement he continued to volunteer with various organizations and became the historian for the Blues Baseball team.

Jean Marie "Jeanie" McDill (Mathematics) passed away in December. Jeanie taught at Cal Poly from 1973 until 2006 and was one of the first women to teach in the department. Starting in the early 1990s she worked with other early adopters of instructional technology to create interactive software tools for visualizing differential equations and business calculus.

Billy Mounts (Health Services) passed away in August. He served as Director of Health Services at Cal Poly and was a member of the Academic Senate. He was active in the local medical community serving in various medical organizations.

John Rogers (Statistics) died in March. He taught Statistics for 33 years and was active in the SLO Bike Club for many years.

Kim Shank (Cal Poly Corporation and University Store) passed way in May. During her career she helped promote the Cal Poly brand and most recently was the general merchandise manager for the University Store and Cal Poly Downtown.

Claude Walbert, Jr. (Audio-Visual) died in July. He was a published author of a variety of short stories.
